They are the set of stories in a casing. Akhilandeshwari alias Akhila forty five, is single, a clerk by profession who has been brought up in a conservative background. Akhila bears the burden of her family losing her own identity. Janaki, the oldest in Coupe, in her whole life depends on her husband and son and always had a man to protect her. Sheela, the youngest of the six who is fourteen years old talks about abuse of a man on a female child. Through Sheela, Nair has brought out the abuse of women by men. Of all those tales the most traumatic is that of Marikolunthu, who is at her thirties a victim of a man's lust. She has experienced physical abuse and poverty. Margaret Shanthi another woman in the Coupe is a flourishing chemistry teacher and her marriage life is unhappy. Her husband is rigorous and uncaring towards her. Margaret wanted to divorce him but does not do so due to the unacceptance of society.

Ladies coupe questions the status of women, rule of an obedient daughter, a docile wife and a producer of children. It mainly focuses the problems of self realization. Through her stories she portrays the sensibilities of a woman, how a woman looks at her issues and her identity.
